### Contest Rules

1. Information can be found on the Virginia FFA website <http://www.vaffa.org>.
2. This contest will be open to FFA chapters across the state. Schools are invited to enter one or two demonstrations. If two demonstrations are entered from a chapter, each must present a different demonstration topic.
3. Demonstrations may be presented by either one individual contestant or a team of two contestants. (Note that awards are presented to ranked demonstration, not individual contestants.)
4. Contestants must be active students in grades 6-12 the school term preceding entry in the contest. There will be two divisions: **Junior Division (Division I)** will be students in grades 6-9 and **Senior Division (Division II)** will be students in grades 10-12. If either member of a team is in or above the tenth-grade level, the team will be considered Division II.
5. No individual may present the same demonstration in successive years.
6. No individual may present the same demonstration as presented in the horticulture demonstration contest.
7. Presentations must be of a demonstration nature (actually doing something), not simply an illustrated talk.
8. Demonstration topics may deal with agriculture within any of the following areas: Plant and Soil Science, Animal Science, Agricultural Marketing & Agricultural Business, Natural Resources Management & Environmental Science, and Agricultural Engineering.
9. Fire, live animals and operational engines may not be used during the demonstration.
10. Each demonstration is limited to 10 minutes. Following the demonstration, the judges (only) may ask questions of the contestant and only about the demonstration for up to 3 minutes.
11. Contestants must provide all equipment and materials required for their demonstrations.
13. The contest will be limited to the first 30 teams/individuals to register in each division.

### Awards

#### State Fair Scholarship Program

Contestants will be eligible to participate in the State Fair Scholarship Program. Please see the **State Fair website, [www.statefairva.org](http://www.statefairva.org), for more information regarding the State Fair of Virginia Scholarship Program and eligibility requirements for other available scholarships.** The following scholarships will be awarded to the top three individuals in **Division II (Senior Division)**. **Should a presentation be a team project, the scholarship money will be split between the two individuals.**

<b>Confidence/ Personality</b>	Speaks with unwavering voice, let's personality shine	Confidence of material, but lacks personality	Very little confidence, shows no personality	
<b>Ease Before Audience</b>	Makes eye contact with audience, no nervous habits	Eye contact most of the time, occasional habits	No eye contact, nervous tics, lots of hesitations	
<b>Power of Expression</b>				<b>10 Points</b>
<b>Communicative Ability</b>	Language conveys the purpose of the demonstration	Understandable most of the time, can be confusing	Lacks the ability to successfully describe the demo	
<b>Directness</b>	Clearly states the procedure, step by step description	Sometimes indirect procedure, purpose is relatively clear	Presentation lacks direction, and is hard to follow	
<b>Fluency</b>	Points flow together, uses transitional phrases	Has organization, lacks transition to keep demo smooth	Moving from point to point is choppy, audience is lost	

<b>Emphasis</b>	Uses voice, tone, and actions to highlight important points	Occasionally points out important steps and procedures	Uses not emphasis, presentation is monotone
<b>Sincerity</b>	Shows passion, obviously has first-hand experience	Sometimes shows enthusiasm, gives good examples	No enthusiasm, shows no evidence of experience
